All About the Site Plans

Site mapping refers to marking out stages, marquees, stalls, rides and other structures at your event, and shaping the space in between. The layout of your event can affect the atmosphere, and is vital for planning emergency routes, power supplies, and determining whether you have enough space for everything planned.

Choosing your Venue
Correct venue selection can determine the success of your event. You might want to consider:

- Can your venue cope with the amount of people expected?
- Is there adequate parking available?
- Is it accessible by public transport?
- Are there protected trees or garden beds that need to be accommodated?

Once you have selected your venue, a site plan can be developed.

It is important to put time and thought into the site plan. It is essential that you have a detailed, clear and accurate plan to give to contractors, security, Council and other stakeholders.

Here's a list of things you might like to think about as you draw up your site plan:

- Festival/event area including surrounding streets
- Market and food stalls
- Entrances and exits
- Emergency entrances and exits (ensure these are large enough for a vehicle – such as a fire engine – to enter)
- · Parking areas including accessible parking
- Liquor licensed areas
- Main performance areas
- Entertainment sites/non stage areas
- Seating
- Toilets (include number)
- Water access
- Tables and chairs
- Rubbish bins
- Vehicle access routes for stall holders and performers (and any allocated parking)
- First aid/ambulance
- Generators and power leads
- Fire fighting equipment (e.g. extinguishers)
- Information/event management office
- Amusements
- Stages and marquees
- Carnival rides
- Adjacent property owners e.g. railway land, shopping centres, etc
- Public transport stops (if in immediate site plan)
